THE MUSEUM. IT STARTED WITH JANE.

The Sheridan Museum of History has come a long way since its inception in 2005. It all began with **Jane Hensley**'s vision to provide a museum for the community. With the help of enthusiastic volunteers, displays were set up at all events throughout the year. This continued until 2012, when **Lucy Hebert** offered a vacant building to operate a museum. The doors were officially opened during Phil Sheridan Days that year, and the museum has been growing ever since. In 2017, a significant renovation project was started on a 1914 building situated on S. Bridge Street, and the museum was moved to this new location in January 2018. We are incredibly grateful to Jane for bringing her idea to fruition and for her unwavering dedication to the museum. Without her drive and innovation, we would not be where we are today. HISTORICAL TIDBIT

SHERIDAN POST OFFICE

To establish a post office, the town needed a name. The founder, A.B. Faulconer, named the town Sheridan in honor of General Philip Henry Sheridan, who had gained notoriety during the Civil War. The first official post office was in the home of Thomas J. Faulconer on East Main Street, where Thomas became the first postmaster. However, the post office changed locations numerous times throughout its lifetime.

From 1875-1887: It was situated in the Alfred Saylor Drug Store, where people had assigned pockets on the back wall of the store to receive their mail.

From 1890-1893: It was located in Henry Graves's store.

From 1893-1902: It was moved to the George Bibee department store on S. Bridge Street.

From 1913-1950: It was located in the Scroggin building on S. Bridge Street, next to the First National Bank.

From 1950-1999: It was situated in a new facility on Harney Street next to the Sheridan Sun office, where it served the community for 49 years.



In 1999-current: It moved to its current building at 137 SE Sheridan Road.

Today, the postmaster of Sheridan is Steve Siemers.
