Museum Kitchen: The museum's kitchen area has recently undergone a significant transformation. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of John Hebert and Travis Dow, we now have a modern counter and ample storage space, replacing the outdated stove. This renovation is a testament to the commitment of our volunteers who consistently work to maintain and improve our facilities.

Plaque Replacement Project: We are actively working on a project to replace the missing plaques in our historic buildings. We initiated this community effort in 2015, but unfortunately, we didn't anticipate the loss of plaques due to building sales or business transitions. We are focusing on placing the plaques on the exterior of the buildings whenever possible. We are grateful for the \$1,000 grant from 99 GAL friends of Yamhill County and the \$500 grant from the City of Sheridan, both will help us in this endeavor.

Air Conditioning Upgrade: The heating system will get an air conditioning upgrade. We have been working on getting funds to accomplish this significant project, which will cost \$10,476. We received a \$2,000 grant from First Federal and have raised \$1,500 from community donations. We have also applied for additional grants but are waiting for their outcomes. This critical air conditioning project will comfort our visitors and help protect our artifacts during the hot summer months.

The Museum Gift Shop is getting an overhaul to accommodate new items.

Hometown Days Celebration June 14 and 15: Longtime museum volunteer Donna Hulett has been selected as grand marshal for the Saturday, June 15, Hometown Days Parade. The parade will begin at 5 p.m. Also, as part of the Hometown Days activities, Donna will present a bed turning on Friday, June 14, at 2 p.m. Attendees will learn about the museum's quilt collection, such as how they were made, the patterns used, and how the museum came to possess each quilt.

Sheridan City Park will host a children's walking parade on Friday. Duck races and other events are also planned for Friday. The museum will be open on both Friday and Saturday.

The museum will host the all-class reunion on Saturday, offering a time to reconnect with old classmates and look through yearbooks and newspapers with articles about classes of days gone by.

History of the Sheridan Fire Department

The Sheridan Volunteer Fire Department began in 1893 under then-mayor J.R. Mendenhall. They met their match during the 1913 fire, which destroyed the business district on South Bridge Street. Until 1926, the only equipment the fire department had was two hose carts and a ladder truck, along with 12 volunteers.

Gone are the days when the sound of the siren alerted citizens to an emergency. Oncall trained volunteers jumped into their cars and drove to the fire station. These men responded from their homes, work, or farms to man the engines, brush trucks, and water tenders. Other community members grabbed handheld stop signs to direct traffic through the major intersections.

As the demand for service has outpaced the supply of available volunteers - especially during the daytime hours - the Sheridan Fire District, like many other small fire service districts, began hiring paid staff to fill the vacant roles.

In May 2022, voters approved a five-year levy with the understanding that the fire district would increase ambulance coverage. Today, the department has accomplished this goal, and two ambulances are currently staffed 24/7.

In 2023, the Sheridan Fire Department responded to 1,850 calls, representing an annual increase of about 10 percent. There are 12 full-time staff, two administrative staff, and several part-time staff. Where there was once a strong pool of volunteers responding from substations in Ballston, Buell, and Sheridan, there are just 10 volunteers today. It is the district's goal to rebuild this valuable volunteer base.

The fire district is also working with the Sheridan School District to develop a fire service training program through the Barbara Roberts Career Technical Center. This partnership will facilitate technical training for high school students and potentially attract new volunteers.

The Sheridan Fire District takes its responsibility of serving the taxpayers seriously and will continue to do everything possible to improve service and decrease response times.
