

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HISTORICAL TIDBIT

Sheridan Fire - 1913

Over the years, four major fires have leveled much of the business district:

- January 12, 1888
- July 18, 1913
- June 3, 1922
- October 11, 1934

The worst fire happened in 1913 burning everything on S. Bridge Street - from the river to the railroad tracks. The fire started at 5:45 pm in the Zeigler & Rice Restaurant, located in the Phillips Building at the corner of Harney & Bridge Streets. Two young men were cooking the meal. When refueling the Kerosene grill, the grill caught fire & flames rapidly spread to both sides of Bridge Street. Things burned quickly because it was a hot summer, most buildings were wooden, and gusty winds fueled the flames. The fire hose would burn as soon as the volunteer firemen attached it to a hydrant, which resulted in battling the fire with bucket brigades & burlap bags.



In little time, everything was gone except for the First National Bank building - its brick wall was still standing. Fifty-six (56) businesses were destroyed with an estimated loss of \$305,000. Only 1/3 of the businesses were covered by insurance.

Within a year, most of the town was rebuilt - thanks to the dedication, hard work, and love for the City of Sheridan.
